Recommendation

THAT Municipal Law Enforcement Report MLE-005-25 regarding By-law Third Quarter Activity Report for 2025 be received;

Background/Analysis

This report provides comparative details on departmental activities over the past 5 years.

The annual comprehensive information has been contained within the Third Quarter Report to assist with the budget and planning process. This report provides a 12-month comparison from October 1st through September 30th the next year. The attachments, which provide detailed information on by-law enforcement activities, have been broken down into the following categories:

Summary of Past Activities

Court Activity (Third Quarter)

On August 14, 2025 there were five (5) matters on the court docket. The following was their disposition:

Clean Yards By-law Violation- 1 Property, 1 Defendant, 1 Charge

- A defendant appeared and entered a guilty plea. A fine of \$25.00 was imposed with 15 days to pay.

Dog on Beach By-law Violation- 2 Defendants, 2 Charges

- A defendant appeared and entered a guilty plea. A fine of \$30.00 was imposed with 15 days to pay.
- No one appeared and the defendant was deemed not to dispute the charge. A fine of \$100.00 was imposed with 15 days to pay.

Noise By-law Violation- 1 Property, 1 Defendant, 1 Charge

- A defendant appeared and entered a guilty plea. A fine of \$100.00 was imposed with 15 days to pay.

Open Burning By-law Violation - 1 Property, 1 Defendant, 1 Charge

- No one appeared and the defendant was deemed no to dispute the charge. A fine of \$150.00 was imposed with 15 days to pay.

On August 18, 2025 there were (12) matters on the court docket. The following was their disposition:

Short-Term Rental By-law Violation - 12 Properties, 22 Defendants, 134 Charges

- All of the above matters were adjourned to October 20, 2025, at 2:30 p.m., for Pre-Trial continuation.

Seasonal Supervisors/Municipal Law Enforcement Officers

In the month of September our 17 seasonal Municipal Law Enforcement Officers completed their summer contracts. While 11 seasonal Officers returned to University or College, the others continued pursuing their future career aspirations. 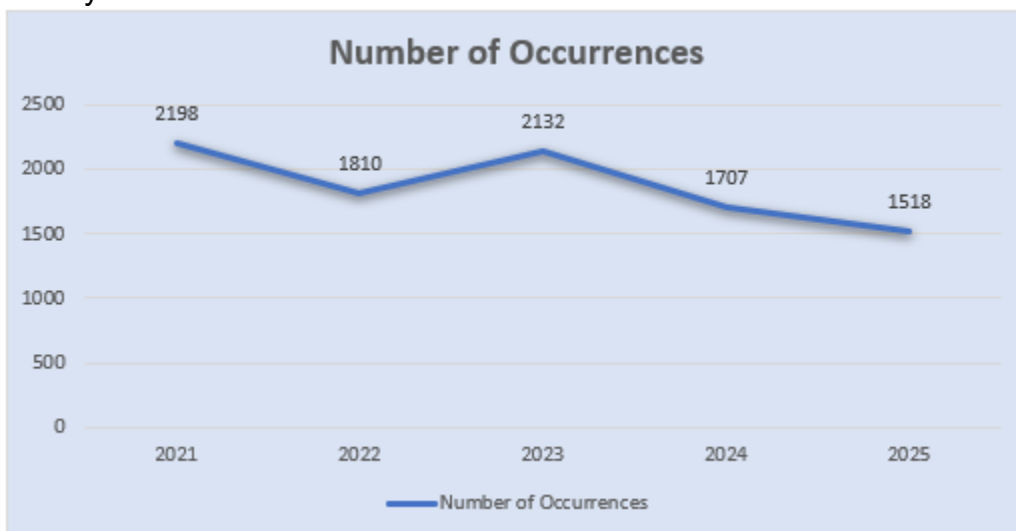
Section #1 General Occurrence (2021 to 2025)

Below is a break down of the number of occurrences received for each type of By-law which are enforced on a routine basis. The weather from year to year always has an impact on the increase or decrease of complaints.

Note: An "occurrence" refers to a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer responding to any complaint (whether it is determined that a by-law violation has occurred or not), or carrying out pro-active enforcement.

The year-over-year occurrences decrease from 1,707 complaints in 2024 to 1,518 complaints in 2025; this is a 13% decrease in occurrences. The following graph demonstrates the 5-year trend in activity.



Staff analyzed some note worthy differences in the various occurrence categories and draw the following conclusions or comments.

Dogs By-law 02-115

Within this category the following changes were identified:

There was a 37% decrease in Dog Control complaints in 2025 when compared to 2024. Additionally, there is a 5 year decrease trend 337%

Staff analyzed the final disposition for the 68 dog occurrences in 2025 and found the following:

- 53% (36) of the complaints offenders were issued a verbal warning;
- 22% (15) of the complaints officers found no violation;
- 19% (13) of the complaints offenders were issued a fine;
- 3% (2) of the complaints offenders were issued a written warning;
- 3% (2) of the complaints were referred to the OPP.

Burning By-law 15-027

Within this category the following Changes were identified:

There was a 111% increase in Burning complaints in 2025 when compares to 2024. After analyzing the charges issued in 2025 for burning, staff determined the increase in charges can be directly correlated to a fire ban being issued on July 30, 2025 and ending on August 20, 2025.

Staff analyzed the final disposition for the 110 fire occurrences in 2025 and found the following:

- 49%(54) of the complaints officers found no violation;
- 33% (37) of the complaints offenders were issued a fine;
- 12% (13) of the complaints offenders were issued a verbal warning;
- 3% (3) of the complaints were referred to the Fire Department;
- 3% (3) of the complaints offenders were apprised and educated;

Short-Term Rentals #22-017

From October 1, 2024 to September 30, 2025, the By-Law Department received complaints related to 80 Short-Term Rental properties. The below table breaks down the complaints during that time period.

Staff analyzed the data and reports and would draw the following conclusions:

Number of Properties with Complaints received - 80 Properties:

- Staff have analyzed the complaints received and have found they are typically submitted by one neighbor, rather than multiple different neighbors in close proximity to the allegation.
- The below illustration represents the number of properties that applied for a license and the corresponding number of properties with no complaints vs properties with complaints. It should be highlighted that 88% of properties do not have any complaints.

The complaints received are related to 80 separate properties which can be further broken down as follows:

- 77 properties averaged 1-4 complaints per property.
- 3 properties (unlicensed) generated 46 complaints or 29% of the total complaints received. The number of complaints received for each of the 3 properties ranges from as many as 5 to 25 complaints per property. (It should be noted that in some situations complainants may send 3 separate complaints within the same minutes thereby skewing the data.) **2 of the properties have been charged/have additional charges pending.**

No Violation:

- Upon review of the 34 No Violation complaints, the Officer's investigation found that in 34 situations no violation existed. In a number of cases, the primary reason for this disposition was that:
 - The complaint was placed days/weeks after the alleged violation, therefore Officers could not gather best evidence;
 - Officers responded to the complaint and were met by the Property Owner utilizing the property for personal use;
 - There was simply no violation of the Short-Term Rental By-law found.

Charges issued/pending - 19 properties

- The charges issued/pending are related to 19 separate properties.
- These matters are either before the courts or are in the process of being charged. Additional details are mentioned at the beginning of this report under the Court Activities section.
- Over the previous 4 quarters (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025) the By-law Department has successfully prosecuted various matters through the court system which has imposed \$3,775 in fines. This is in addition to the \$11,760 in fines reported last year (Total since the start: \$15,535)

Reminder to residents- please ensure that complaints are being submitted to the appropriate agencies and that the complaints process outlined on the Township's website is being followed. Furthermore, complaints should be submitted while the violation is taking place. This allows for Officers to gather best evidence and track complaint statistics.

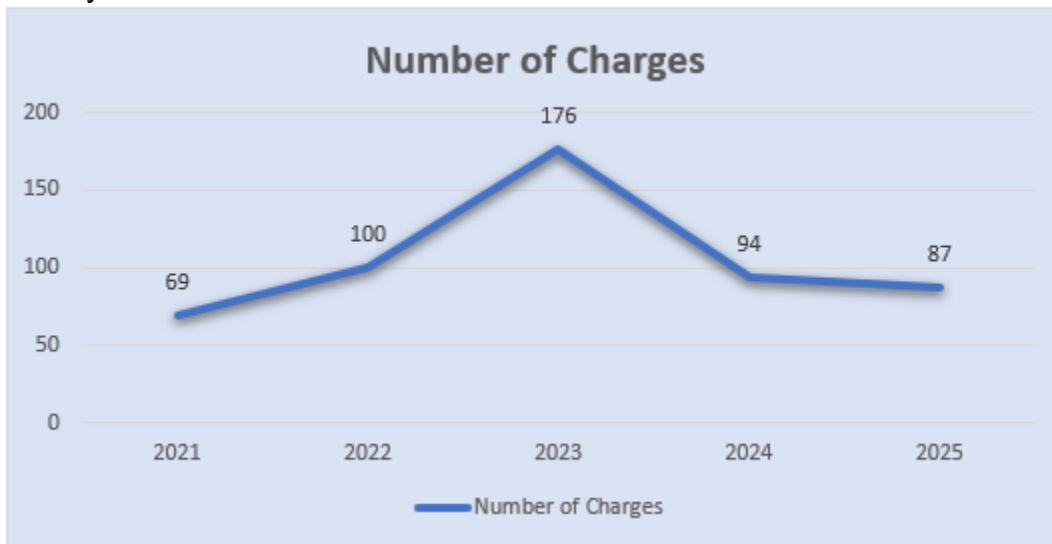

Compared to last year, The number of charges has decreases by 7 charges. In 2025 there were 87 charges issued, and 94 charges issued in 2024. The following graph demonstrates the 5-year trend in activity.



Staff analyzed the charges issued and noticed some of the noteworthy differences between 2024 & 2025 in the various occurrence categories and would draw the following conclusions or comments:

Fire By-law

Staff reviewed the fire charges for 2025 and found a noteworthy increase from 8 charges in 2024, to 37 charges in 2025. After analyzing the charges issued in 2025 for burning, staff determined the increase in charges can be directly correlated to a fire ban being issued on July 30, 2025 and ending on August 20, 2025. Of the 30 charges issued for fires during 2025, 35 of the charges were issued for having a fire during a fire ban.

Dog By-law

Staff reviewed the dog control charges and found a noteworthy decrease from 29 charges in 2024, to 14 charges in 2025. Staff analyzed each charge and found the following:

- 12 (86%) charges were issued for permitting a dog on Balm Beach between June 1st and September 30th;
- 1 (7%) charge was issued for permitting a dog to run at large on Woodland Beach.
- 1 (7%) charge was issued for permitting a dog to run at large on Jackson's Beach.

Parks By-law

Staff analyzed the parks charges for 2025 and found a 120% increase this summer compared to the previous year in 2024. Staff reviewed each charge and found the following:

- 5 (46%) charges were issued for having a barbeque upon Balm Beach.
- 3 (27%) charges were issued for having a barbeque upon a Municipal Beach.
- 1 (9%) charge was issued for having a barbeque upon a sidewalk.
- 1 (9%) charge was issued for having a barbeque upon a Municipal Boardwalk.
- 1 (9%) charge was issued for operating a motorized machine in a Municipal Park.

The above is a consolidated chart by grouping locations together (ex.2300 TBRS (Archer Drive) to 2134A TBRS which includes 6 separate walkway locations). The bottom corner of the chart indicates the number of beach patrols and the corresponding number of situations where an officer recorded an Action Taken. The actions could range from providing education or warnings to issuing a Part I Ticket. Staff analyzed the above chart and noted a decrease in the number of patrols completed compared to 2024. Staff believe the decrease is related to staff spending majority of their shift in one location due to the volume of cars and people looking to use one of our major beach parks. The below chart shows the results of the patrols from the last 5 years.

Section #4 Parking Permits

Resident Parking Permit Program

The following section provides details on the Resident Parking Permit Program. The amounts have been broken down below to show the number of Parking Permits issued and the associated revenue. The sale of Resident Parking Permits has continued to increase over the years.

Resident Parking Permits

The following chart displays the number of Parking Permits issued and the corresponding revenue.

*1- In 2021 parking permits were required at all beach locations until August 6th due to COVID-19. On August 6th Pay Parking was brought back at 4 beach parks with master plans.

*2- In 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025 Pay Parking was available at the 4 beach parks with master plans as well as the Hotspot App. Resident Parking Permits were required in all permit parking locations.

Background: The annual cost of a seasonal Non-Resident Parking Permit was:

- From 2013-2021 the cost was \$100.00 (excluding taxes)
- in 2024 the cost was increased to \$150.00 (excluding taxes)

In 2021, approximately 100 people requested non-resident parking permits after they sold out on April 1, 2021. On April 7, Council directed staff to proceed by issuing an additional 50 non-resident permits due to the influx of applications received. This led to a lottery system process in which case the approximate 100 additional applications submitted after being sold out were placed in the lottery.

In May 2022, Council approved the use of the HotSpot Parking App to allow for non-residents to apply for a daily non-resident parking permit (no seasonal permit). The cost of the software for this program was \$10,000.00 for the year. Council approved 14 daily permits to be issued every day at the fee of \$20.00 per permit.

In 2022, Council approved the use of the HotSpot program at a cost of \$10,000.00 per year. Council directed staff to make 14 daily permits available, \$20/permit, on a first come first serve basis from April 15th to October 15th. There were 62 permits purchased generating \$1,240 in revenue.

In 2023, Council approved the use of the existing HotSpot program at a cost of \$10,000.00 per year. Council approved the program with a single modification to offer 10 Non-Resident Parking Permits daily, at a cost of \$20.00 each, and 225 Non-Resident Parking Permits, for a six-month period, on a first come, first serve basis at a cost of \$150.00 each. This program provides Non-Residents with greater access to Permit Parking Areas and is keeping with concerns raised regarding affordability.

In 2024, following two years of utilizing the daily non-resident parking permit program at a cost of \$10,000.00 per year, the program generated \$1,900.00 in revenue. This resulted in a shortfall of \$18,100.00 over the course of 2 years. In 2024 funding was not provided for software and the system returned to the 225 limit for 2024 and 2025.

Special Occasion Parking Permits

The Special Occasion Parking Permit Program (SOPP) remains the same and provides the same type of Special Occasion Permits as in the past (i.e. weddings, family reunions, etc.). All SOPP are allowed in Open Parking/Permit Parking Areas only (not in NO PARKING areas).

Staff analyzed the above chart and noted an increase in business licensing activity in 2025 compared to 2024. Staff analyzed this increase and noticed it was primarily due to the amount of restaurant licenses issued in 2025.

As of September 30, 2025, the Township had received a total of 148 Short-Term Rental License Applications submitted, with 152 spots remaining.

As of September 30, 2025, 143 Licenses have been approved which are reflected on the Short-Term Rental Interactive Mapping system.

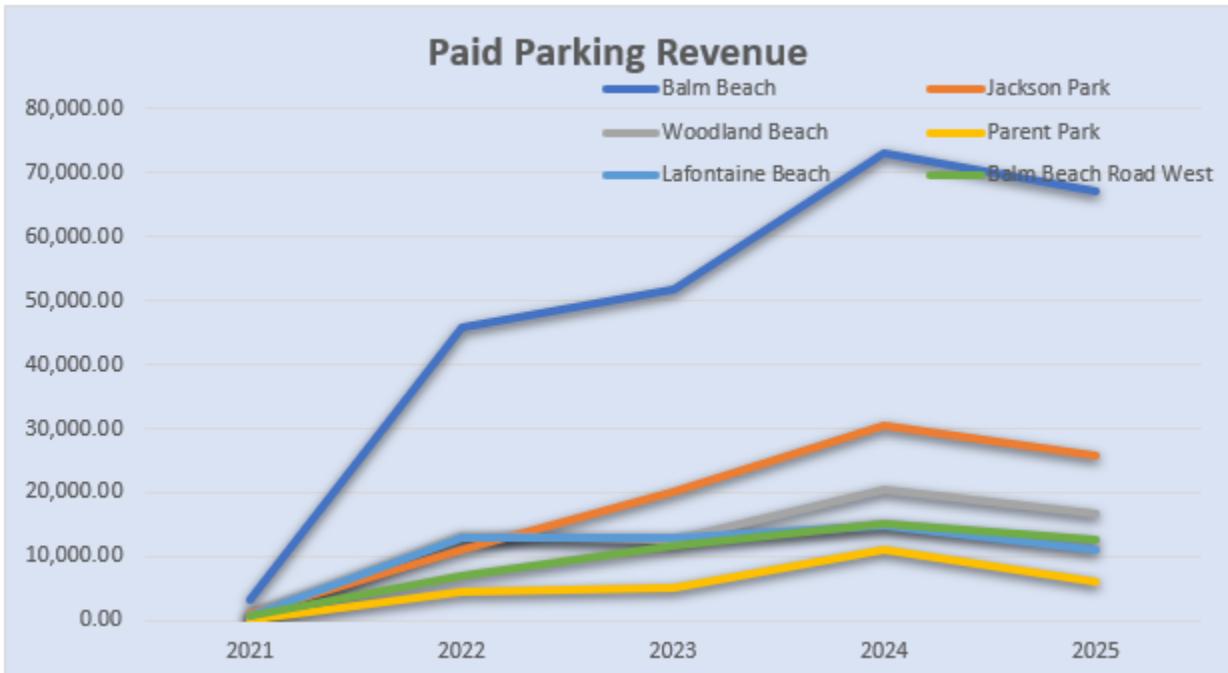

Section #10 2025 By-law Department Bike Programs

Target Areas and Benefits:

In 2015, the initial Bike Program came into effect, consisted of two bikes, focusing on Tiny Trail enforcement, especially between the Town of Penetanguishene and 13th Concession East where complaints have been received regarding loose dogs, dogs defecating and graffiti. Staff also patrolled various neighborhoods for violations of the Lawn Watering By-law and neighborhood parks.

From 2019 to 2025, the program was approved for four bikes. All areas of the Township remained patrolled with bikes and the department was able to send the bike program to daily hotspots and help with Township events.

Areas that the Bike Program patrolled in 2025 were:

- Tiny Beaches Road North & South
- Wyevale
- Perkinsfield
- Tiny Rail Trail
- Lafontaine
- Concession 8 West to Concession 13 West
- Archer Road to Concession 5 West
- Concession 15 West to Concession 17 West

- Sawlog Bay and Champlain
- Beach Parks with Master Plans

Staff have analyzed the above chart and noted an increase in the total kilometers patrolled compared to 2024. Staff attributes the 2025 increase to having a fairly dry summer which resulted in the bikes being busy.

Public Interactions - Public interaction was a daily experience while the bikes were on patrol. The following are a few of the comments received multiple times while on patrol which is again consistent with previous years:

1. Multiple conversations with residents and member of the public seeking general information.
2. Multiple conversations with members of the public regarding their enthusiasm about the bikes patrolling the Tiny Trail, Tiny Beaches Road North and South and Champlain Road.
3. Answered questions about Short Term Rental Properties and strict enforcement policy.
4. Engaged in various conversations regarding the bike program and what officers are patrolling for with members of the public.
5. Several interactions on the Tiny Trail regarding animals such as horses and dogs being permitted.

Parking Control By-law:

The Township of Tiny would like to remind the community that parking restrictions supports road safety, traffic flow, accessibility, emergency vehicle access and assists the Township in managing its maintenance standards. Parking Control By-law 20-015, as amended, stipulates a number of parking restrictions within the Township of Tiny. If the vehicle has not been removed within three (3) hours of the first ticket being issued, the vehicle will receive a second parking ticket and may also be removed from the area by tow at the owner’s expense. The below list is some of the most common violations. No person shall park a vehicle on a highway:

- where signs regarding Disabled Parking have been erected and are on display - \$300 Fine;
- or parking area where parking is prohibited - \$90 Fine;
- where signs regarding Tow-Away Zones have been erected and are on display - \$90 Fine;
- where signs regarding Fire Access Routes have been erected and are on display - \$90 Fine;
- where signs regarding Disabled Parking have been erected and are on display - \$300 Fine;
- in a Permit Parking Zone without a Parking Permit - \$90 Fine.

With the upcoming Labour Day long weekend approaching, the Township of Tiny would like to remind the community that [Fireworks By-law 07-054](#), prohibits the display of and setting off of fireworks outside of Victoria Day, Canada Day, New Year’s Eve, and New Year’s Day. Therefore, the discharge of fireworks is strictly prohibited within the municipality outside of these four days. Noise Control By-law

The Township of Tiny would like to remind the community that [Noise Control By-law #21-028](#), Section 3.1 states: “No person shall emit or cause or permit the emission of noise resulting from activity listed in Schedule “A” if clearly audible at a point of reception.” The following are two examples of complaints commonly reported to the municipality:

- The operation of any electronic device or group of connected electronic devices incorporating one or more loudspeakers or other electromechanical transducers, and intended for the production, reproduction, or amplification of sound;
- Persistent barking, calling or whining or other similar persistent noise made by any domestic pet or any other animal kept or used for any purpose other than agriculture.

Shoreline By-law

The Township of Tiny’s new shoreline protection and permit process are temporarily on hold due to an appeal of one of the new by-laws.

On May 26, 2025, the Township of Tiny enacted three by-laws to regulate site alteration activities within Tiny’s shoreline through a permit process. The by-laws enacted include:

- [By-law 25-035](#) to adopt Official Plan Amendment #5;
- [By-law 25-039](#) to amend Zoning By-law 22-05; and
- [By-law 25-040](#) to enact a Shoreline By-law

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The Zoning By-law Amendment (By-law 25-039) is being appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal which means that the previously enacted [Interim Control By-law](#) remains in effect until the appeal process is complete. This means that new structures, fences, boathouses, retaining walls, patios, decks, landscaping and site alteration in proximity to the 178-metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline continues to be prohibited at this time.

During the appeal process, the Township is unable to process permits for work within proximity to the 178-metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline, as intended through the enactment of the Shoreline By-law

Temporary Beach Encroachments

Residents and visitors are reminded that personal items/private property cannot be left unattended or on municipally owned property overnight. Personal property also cannot be stored on municipal property. Examples of personal items include but are not limited to:

- chairs
- tables
- watercraft
- boats and their launches/docks/lifts
- decks/platforms
- fire pits
- umbrellas and tents
- kayaks; and
- paddleboards

Personal items left on municipal property will be labelled with a yellow warning tag and must be removed within seven calendar days. Where a tagged item is not removed within seven calendar days, the municipality will remove the items and store them at a municipal facility to allow property owners to recover their items. If the items at the municipal facility are not claimed by the owner within 30 days, the items will be disposed of.
